1. Background of the Programme

To support and implement the NEASPEC Nature Conservation Strategy⁴ for key migratory bird species (Black-faced Spoonbill, Hooded Crane, and White-naped Crane), NEASPEC undertakes the project 'Conservation and Rehabilitation of Habitats for Key Migratory Birds' during 2013-2015.

The Project's objectives are to contribute the conservation of target species; and to promote transboundary and intergovernmental cooperation and enhance coordinated mechanism for their conservation. Under these objectives, scoping surveys⁵, joint studies⁶ and capacity building and awareness raising programme are carried out on the three NEASPEC flagship migratory bird species by national focal points of the Project⁷.

With respect to capacity building and awareness raising programme, the Korean Society of

Environment and Ecology (KSEE), the national focal point of the Project for the Republic of Korea, will organize the training prgramme for young scientists and practitioners in North-East Asian countries; and UNESCAP East and North-East Asia Office, as NEASPEC secretariat overseeing the overall Project. Following the training programme for early career leaders for 5 days, an international education programme for junior high school students in local community where Black-faced Spoonbills mainly inhibited in Republic of Korea will be held for raising awareness among local community.

2. Expected Outcomes of the Programme

- 2.1 Gaining relevant knowledge and skills for the conservation of flagship species and its habitat;
- 2.2 International workshop on Conservation and Rehabilitation of Habitats for Key Migratory Birds with special emphasis on Black-faced Spoonbills;
- 2.3 Supports professional development and conservation action in local places in the sub-region;
- 2.4 Building the network among early career conservationists, senior conservation leaders and multi-layered conservation organizations in the sub-region.

3. Composition of the Programme and Training Subjects

The 5-day training programme will be consisted of an one-day indoor session, International workshop, and a four-day outdoor session. Most part of the programme will be conducted in interactive mode outside. The programme focuses on topics including:

- Conservation history and Challenges in the North-East Asia;
- Multi-layered and multi-lateral governance on conservation of migratory birds and their habitats in the region;
- Integrated ecosystem-based approach to conserve birds' habitat;
- Biotope survey, Habitat mapping and Better Land Use;
- Cooperation for transboundary protected areas;
- Sustainable development for local community including eco-tourism, and;
- Communication and Education skills for Conservation
